#### The Dissenters by Youssef Rakha

#### Novel / February 2025 / World English: Graywolf / Translation: Ayesha Pande

A novel about an Egyptian woman named Mouna told in part via letters from her son, Nour, to her daughter who has emigrated to the United States. Nour's retelling of Mouna's life is a kind of haunting, a portal through which he relives his mother's life while also observing it—and through which the author explores Egypt's recent history, particularly the revolution and its aftermath. Rakha was recognized on the Beirut39 list of most promising Arab writers. By the author of *The Crocodiles* and *Book of the Sultan's Seal*.

# The Freedom of Birds by Kiprop Kimutai

A sensitively rendered debut novel that follows Bungei, a young man who returns to his mother's house in his small hometown of Tolosio in rural western Kenya after losing his job and his boyfriend in Nairobi, where he had escaped after his community discovered he was gay and threatened to kill him. His mother, Ferono, is struggling after the death of her husband, and they both find companionship in Ahithophel, who they hire to work on the house and grounds.

#### *Taiwan Travelogue* by Yáng Shuang-zi, trans. from the Chinese by Lin King Novel / November 2024 / World English: Graywolf / Translation: SpringHill Publishing \*Winner of the Golden Tripod Award

An inventive, multilayered work that masquerades as a Chinese translation of a 1954 Japanese novel by Aoyama Chizuko. This fictional novel within the novel is based on Chizuko's experience traveling Taiwan in the late 1930s, when Taiwan was a colonial outpost of Japan, and it follows Chizuko as she becomes enamored with Taiwan and with the young Taiwanese woman who serves as her interpreter. When Chizuko tries to rescue her interpreter from an arranged marriage, she is rebuffed. On the surface a travelogue full of delightful descriptions of food, this highly original novel gradually reveals its subjects to be imperialism and language.

# **Origin Stories by Corinna Vallianatos**

#### Stories / February 2025 / World English: Graywolf / Translation: WME

A collection shot through with humor and insight that investigates womanhood, motherhood, marriage, female friendship, artistic ambition and failure, and the origins of love and shame. The characters in these stories seek the kinds of elusive knowledge, tranquility, or reinvention that are lost to the past or exist only in an unknown future. By the author of *The Beforeland*.

#### Trying by Chloe Caldwell

A candid, intimate memoir about infertility and the process of trying to conceive that explores expectation and irresolution, desire and disappointment, control and acceptance, nature and technology, and what is sold to women as they negotiate these tensions. Caldwell continues to probe the heartbreak of thwarted desire and the self-reconfiguration that follows, which is the hallmark of all of her work, particularly the cult-classic autobiographical novella *Women*.

#### *Close Cover / Strike Gently* by Jenny Boully Nonfiction / Fall 2025 / World: Graywolf

Boully details the danger and despair of growing up female and Asian American, through stories of everyday abuse, neglect, and poverty; her early sexual experiences, consensual and not; and the risky lengths she goes to fit into and survive a world of street gangs and skinheads, punk shows and drugs. Drawing from four volumes spanning Otta's career, Matuk has curated a playlist that honors Otta's drive toward liberation through *perreo* in the club and transdimensional wandering among the stars.

# The Rose by Ariana Reines

An intimate, sensual collection of poetry centered on control over one's own body. With elements of magic, the medieval, and myth, *The Rose* seeks to unsettle the notion that one must define the directions of one's erotic feeling or control and police the boundaries of one's outward-facing identity. # **Bluff** by Danez Smith
