















Is it ever ok to make the wrong decision for the right reasons?


Fluent in French and German, my research into life in Gurs relied heavily on source documents, primarily testimonies and memoirs, most of which were in French.

The stories combine the emotional satisfaction and the entertaining appeal of *Bluey*, the recognition of the depth of children's intellect, curiosity and feelings and the keys to manage through relatable characters, an approach mastered for decades by Fred Rogers, and an abundance of visual humour.


