As secrets of the past surface, an accident leaves their father and the assistant keeper injured, and Max and Rose must care for them while keeping the lighthouse burning through the night.



Author note: Gurs Internment Camp – little known and little explored
When I started writing *The Year We Escaped*, my plan was to write about a cluster of French villages where many, many Jewish children were given refuge during the Second World War.

Instead, I found myself heading towards the still relatively unknown French internment camp of Gurs. Little has been written in English about this camp and the daily lives of the internees.

Fluent in French and German, my research into life in Gurs relied heavily on source documents, primarily testimonies and memoirs, most of which were in French.

When Darwin is bombed in 1942, Ava and her mother are evacuated to Lake Boga, where the truth about the destruction is kept secret. Desperate to contribute, Ava's mother joins the WAAAF, while Ava faces a moral dilemma when Kazuo escapes the camp and finds her.

Should she protect her friend or follow the rules?
