Amanda was born in Hong Kong and survived both a convent boarding school and a Jesuit boys' school before being summarily ejected from the latter. She gets her thirst for adventure from her parents who met in the jungle in Borneo where her mother had set up a hospital and her father, a former Gurkha Intelligence officer and Oxford-educated spy, was probably up to no good.

The Silence Before Dawn, the first in her bestselling WW2

thriller series was published in September 2022 and the second, Paris At First Light, in November 2022, both also to excellent reviews. The third book in the series, The Midwife's Child, was published in May 2023 and the latest, The Paris Spy's Girl, in February 2024. All of these can be read as standalones. The fifth book in the series, If I Can Save One Child, will be published in July 2024. She was elected to the board of the Crime Writers Association in 2024.

Amanda's latest novel is *The Key to the Island House.* The grand painted arches and turquoise tiles in front of me exactly match those in the photograph in my hand. I've found my beloved aunt's villa. The place she loved – and feared. And the place she tried so hard to keep secret...

Egypt, 1942. After her husband and baby son are killed, Nadia flees to Villa Eden in Cairo. The gorgeous scents of the blooms and calming water garden soothe her aching heart... and give her the strength to keep fighting.

With a group of other young Europeans at the villa, she works undercover against the Nazi threat to Egypt. Friendships form as they host extravagant parties for ambassadors and generals – and gather vital information whispered in quiet corners.

Until betrayal snatches yet another person she loves from Nadia. And the villa's high walls may be the only place to keep a dark wartime secret safe...

Catriona McPherson writes a series of 1920/30s detective stories and a separate strand of contemporary psychological suspense. Her novels have won two Anthony awards, two Agathas, three Bruce Alexanders, two Macavitys, a Lefty, a Falchion, and an IndieFab Gold in the USA and been shortlisted for a CWA dagger, an MWA Edgar and three Mary Higgins Clark awards. Catriona was born in a village outside Edinburgh in 1965 and educated at Edinburgh University, leaving with a Ph.D. in Linguistics. She has been writing full-time since 2000 and, since 2010, has lived in northern California. Catriona's entire back list including 14 Dandy Gilver books (published in both the US and UK) is available.

The Dead Room, Catriona's latest novel, is a psychological suspense that intertwines grief, memory, and mystery in a setting brimming with nostalgia and unease, was sold to Thomas & Mercer along with another title.

It's *Sleeping Murder* meets *Gaslight*, and follows Lindsay Hale, a woman returning to her childhood home in the aftermath of her husband's death. Lindsay needs the comfort of her family and her old familiar friends. At first, it seems she's found them. Her brother and his wife say she's welcome to stay as long as she wants in the family home, a bungalow next to the family scrapyard, and her oldest and closest pal, Chloe, is there for whatever Lindsay needs. She even forms a new bond with an older woman, Peggy, a widow like herself, someone who can point the way. Finally, unbelievably, she meets a man. It's far too soon but he's kind as well as funny and is willing to take it slow.

And yet there is something very wrong, something more than grief, something Lindsay can only see out of the corner of her eye. Why does she think she recognises strangers? Why can't she remember the people she used to know? And how can an elderly widow like Peggy disappear and only Lindsay notices she's gone?

Then there's the house. Lindsay's beautiful house, her enormous, unfillable dream-come-true of a house that, after dark, fills with nightmares. They must be nightmares, all in her mind. Surely none of this can be true. Lindsay has come home. So where can she run to?

The group has been set up for like-minded women to come together, but when their therapist leaves, they close the blinds and find a new, and altogether more deadly way to support each other...


Darren has just finished The Perfect Home for Joffe Books






Before becoming an author of fiction in the early 1960's John Gardner was variously a stage magician, a Royal Marine officer and a journalist. In all, Gardner has fifty-four novels to his credit, including a series of highly acclaimed comic novels featuring a cowardly secret agent called Boysie Oakes. He was also invited by Ian Fleming's literary copyright holders to write a series of continuation *James Bond* novels, which proved to be so successful that instead of the contracted three books he went on to publish some fourteen titles. Having lived in the Republic of Ireland, the United States and the UK, John Gardner sadly died in August of 2007 having just completed his third novel in the Moriarty trilogy. Moriarty, was published here in the UK by Quercus


and in the US by Harcourt in November 2008.






Kate Glanville was born in West Africa to Irish parents. Kate now lives in rural West Wales with her three children, two dogs, three cats and a guinea pig.







Originally from Montreal, Louise moved to the UK nearly thirty years ago after falling in love with a British sailor. She began writing short fiction, and in 2010 won the Woman & Home Magazine Short Story Competition. Her entry *Black Rock*, was subsequently published as part of an anthology, 'The Best Little Book Club in Town' (Orion 2011), alongside writers such as Ruth Rendell, Jodi Picoult and Lee Child. This gave her the confidence to embark on her first novel, a young adult dystopia, 'The Time of Forgetfulness', and then her adult psychological thriller 'The Lake,' which was published by Avon Books in March 2021.

Louise's second novel with Avon, *My Husband's Secrets*, was published in 2022. On the evening of their wedding anniversary, Ali and Matthew are involved in a fatal car accident.

The second book in the series was published earlier this year. Being Dead is Easy: Grace Midwinter thought the worst was behind her. She might well have been wrong.

Nine months after surviving being held captive by a serial killer, probation officer Grace Midwinter is trying to rebuild her life. But when her good friend Layla Mitchell is found dead, and the police seem convinced it's a suicide, Grace isn't so sure. Mark McCrum began his career as a travel writer, with well-received books about Southern Africa (*Happy Sad Land*), Australia (*No Worries*) and Ireland (*The Craic*). A continuing interest in people in unusual settings then led him to document the UK's first two Reality TV series, 1900 House and Castaway 2000 (both top ten bestsellers).

He then accepted an invitation to write about Robbie Williams on his sell out 'Sermon on the Mount' tour of Europe, which became the No. 1 bestseller, *Somebody Someday*.

Mark's next book was *Going Dutch In Beijing*, a light-hearted account of the differences in etiquette around the world. After that came *Walking With The Wounded*, which told the powerful story of four wounded soldiers and their successful attempt to reach the North Pole. He has also ghost written for subjects ranging from legendary TV explorer Bruce Parry (*Tribe*) to survivors of forced marriage (*Jack and Zena*), amongst nameless others.


Most recently, Mark has turned to crime, with three well-received whodunnits: *The Festival Murders, Cruising to Murder* and *Murder Your Darlings*, which was selected as a book of the year by the Mail on Sunday, who described it as 'wonderfully realised'. Of *Cruising to Murder*, the Daily Mail wrote, 'it has a charm and wit that the mistress of crime herself might admire'. *Ghosted* was published by Bloodhound Books in 2023.


Death on the Press Trip is Mark's latest standalone novel, and follows a group of journalists on the eponymous junket around South America. This is an intelligent double whodunnit with a teasing structure that will appeal to fans of the TV series The White Lotus. We know, from the start, that a member of the party won't be coming home alive, but it isn't revealed which member, or why they are not to return, or who or what might be responsible.


Is the mystery death of the title the result of murderous tensions growing within the group; the action of a sinister outsider; or an accident or natural catastrophe? When he's not researching creative ways to commit murder (in books, of course), he doubles as a chemical engineering undergrad at the University of Lagos.

Olayinka's debut novel is *The Crimson Vigilante* published by Masobe Books. A brutal murder. A cryptic message. A city on edge. And a thrilling ride begins...

Richard Jerram was raised in the north, but long ago ventured south in search of education and employment. He lives near a park in London with his wife and, at times, children. Runs slowly. Swims enthusiastically. Plays chess competently. Reads. The fertile soil of the UEA's crime fiction MA gave rise to The Makoto Murders, Richard's first novel. A noir thriller, set in Tokyo, it won the Crime Writers' Association's Debut Dagger award in 2024.

In a previous life, Richard used an economics doctorate from the LSE to find employment in London, Tokyo and Singapore. It has occurred to him that working as an economist in financial markets might be closer to being a crime fiction writer than many people realise.

Richard's latest novel is a gripping and atmospheric literary-crime thriller set against the vivid backdrop of Tokyo, and combines a deeply flawed protagonist with a richly textured setting and an original, unsettling premise. Bought by Titan.

With a darkly immersive tone and a protagonist as compelling as he is morally ambiguous, *The Makoto Murders* challenges the conventions of the genre while delivering an unforgettable story. At the heart of *The Makoto Murders* is Ken Kato, a photojournalist whose relentless pursuit of the next big story has left his personal life in tatters. Once celebrated for capturing an iconic image of tragedy, Ken has spent the years since that professional "triumph" struggling to find his next defining moment.

But when his past entanglements and obsessive tendencies lead him into the orbit of a disturbing murder case, Ken's world spirals into a dangerous labyrinth of deceit, obsession and self-destruction. His voice is sharp, cynical and uncomfortably honest: he's someone whose motivations are as complex as the crimes he documents.

Richard O'Rawe was born into the Lower Falls area of Belfast and experienced the full force of the civic unrest that enveloped Northern Ireland for thirty years. In 2005, he wrote his first book *Blanketmen*. It was a political book about the 1981 IRA/INLA hunger strike and was an Irish best-seller. Richard's second book was written in 2010 and was entitled *Afterlives*.

Then he wrote In the *Name of the Son*, in 2017. This was a biography of Richard's life-long friend, Gerry Conlon, of the Guildford Four. His first novel, *Northern Heist* was published in


2018 by Merrion Press. TV and film rights were sold to ENVISION ENT LTD. Then came the next heist novel in the Ructions O'Hare series; *Goering's Gold* in 2022. *Stakeknife's Dirty War* was published by Merrion Press in 2023 and tells the story of Scappaticci, the IRA's Nutting Squad, and the British spooks who ran the war.

Witch Hunt is a novel co-authored by Ricky and his daughter Bernadette and has been sold to Severn House.

This gripping, sinister thriller weaves police procedural with historical horror in an engaging plot, relatable protagonists and tightly orchestrated suspense. It explores themes of power, misogyny and revenge, wrapped in a narrative that encompasses suspense and social commentary. Ricky and Berni have completed extensive edits on the book, too, based on feedback from our beta readers.

Detective Superintendent Grace O'Malley and journalist Juliette Bouchet are drawn into the macabre and chilling deeds of a self-styled "Witchfinder General," Matthew Hopkins. His actions echo the brutality of the historical figure of the same name, who hunted witches in 17th-century England. Hopkins puts a horrifying spectacle into motion: a woman burned alive on a remote-controlled boat in the Thames, symbolically reenacting the witch trials.

Rowena Macdonald lives in London, and has worked in the House of Commons – the setting for her debut novel *The Threat Level Remains Severe*, (Gallic Books) – for the past 22 years.

Part thriller and part black comedy about the worlds of work and dating. *The Threat Level Remains Severe* has a Bridget Jones-esque heroine and is also a satirical behind-the-scenes look at Westminster. A pilot script for a six-part TV series has been adapted from this novel by Tim John (*A Streetcat Named Bob*) and is on submission to production companies.

Her debut story collection, *Smoked Meat* (Flambard Press), was short-listed for the 2012 Edge Hill Prize. Her stories have won or been short-listed in many competitions, including the VS Pritchett Prize and the Galley Beggar Press Prize, and they have been published by Glimmer Train, Influx Press, Galley Beggar Press, Ambit, Unthank Books, and Serpent's Tail, among others.

The Temptation of Ralph Lauren is Rowena's latest novel. It is set in and around Selfridges, and narrated from the point of view of the iconic store's CCTV operator and security guard, Paul.

There is much to intrigue, amuse and shock the reader across this blend of whimsical social satire and human drama, spanning comedy, tragedy and everything in between. From sex and desire to luxury, designer goods, consumerism, religion and illness, Rowena has weaved a complex web of themes, characters and situations into a fascinating and poignant whole.

English graduate and former senior commissioning editor Samantha King lives in west London with her husband and two teenage children. As a parent, Sam is steeped in the nuances of modern family life; as a qualified psychotherapist, she is fascinated by human behaviour. Writing psychological suspense novels has become a thrilling alchemy of both, enabling Sam to (safely) play out her darkest fears by creating emotionally charged scenarios laced with domestic peril that push her characters to their limits.

Sam's debut novel, *The Choice* (published by Piatkus/Little, Brown), was an international bestseller that explored a mother's nightmare decision about which of her children to save. 

Steven's next work in progress is *The Murder of Matthew Jones*, which examines the impact of being a murder detective on different police officers at various stages of their careers. It shines a light, in particular, on how officers cope when they know who committed a crime but are unable to prove it. As with In the Footsteps of the Missing, Steven's commitment to research is second to none, and he is in the process of interviewing detectives to ensure veracity of process and emotion.

Lucy was born and grew up in the southwest of England. After studying English & Comparative French Literature at Bristol University, she wandered off to France and eventually found herself setting up a small organic goat-farm in the middle of nowhere.

Fifteen years later, she decided to retrain as a translator, working full-time until AI stole most of her clients. Lucy still lives in the wilderness with her partner, dog, cats, donkey, chickens and vegetable garden, making just enough money to survive by proofreading, copyediting, occasionally translating, and casting a critical human eye over AI's

soulless suggestions. She has three adult daughters.

Stricken: A Mother's Story of Stroke and its Aftermath is the account of a devastating brain haemorrhage and its profound aftermath told by Lucy.

In January 2022, Lucy woke to the message no parent ever wants to receive: her 24-year-old daughter Rachel, living alone in Belgium, had collapsed from a massive stroke. Within hours, Lucy's quiet life in rural southwest France - where she has long lived simply as a translator, former goat farmer, and single mother of three adult daughters - was obliterated. What followed was a two-year descent into hospital wards, language barriers, impenetrable Covid-era regulations, bureaucracy without mercy, and a battle for her daughter's survival and dignity in a system that did not seem to see her as a whole human being, or Lucy as a voice worth hearing.

Stricken is more than a medical narrative; it is a testimony to the fierce endurance of maternal love, the isolation of caring, the raw terror of not being believed or heard by medical systems and the truth that, no matter their age, our children remain heartbreakingly vulnerable.


Malachi has a PhD in Creative Writing from Queen's University and in 2019 he was given a Major Artist Award by the Arts Council of Northern Ireland.







In her new book *Self-Led Healing: Simple rules for taking action over your trauma, starting today,* sold to Penguin Australia and Bloomsbury, Dr. Woodhouse shares the personal journey of her MS diagnosis, which ultimately led her to confront and heal her own trauma. Although she spent 15 years researching PTSD, it took her own health crisis to truly understand it. The book explores questions about why many of us need to hit rock bottom before we change, and how unresolved childhood trauma keeps us stuck in harmful patterns that affect our mental, emotional, and physical wellbeing. Through personal stories, client case studies, and neuroscience research, Dr. Woodhouse outlines the path to breaking free from these patterns and argues that we are the agents of our own healing. It's a call to action for self-healing and meaningful change.


