### Questions 27 & 28 by Karen Tei Yamashita

#### Novel / April 2026 / World English: Graywolf / Translation: Fischbach Creative

An expansive novel in which each chapter takes on the perspective of a historical figure of Japanese descent who lived in the Americas. Yamashita explores these characters through the lens of questions 27 and 28 from the Loyalty Questionnaire given to 120,000 Japanese Americans who were interned during WWII; their responses about their willingness to serve in the US military and to foreswear allegiance to the Japanese emperor created lasting rifts within and between families. While going through a box of her mother's things, she unleashes a demon that possesses her neighbor. What follows is a gripping story of familial grief. A bold debut novel about sound, influence, estrangement, and memory that unfolds in two parallel tracks, one past and one present. The historical thread focuses on the Russian composer and pianist Sergei Prokofiev during his university days in Saint Petersburg and his intense friendship with a page-turner named Max. The contemporary thread explores the unusual friendship between a vintage piano restorer and Ada, a classically trained pianist working as a librarian; they share a mutual obsession with Prokofiev.

## The Freedom of Birds by Kiprop Kimutai

Novel / Winter 2027 / World: Graywolf

#### \*Winner of the Graywolf African Fiction Prize

A sensitively rendered debut novel that follows Bungei, a young man who returns to his mother's house in his small hometown of Tolosio in rural western Kenya after losing his job and his boyfriend in Nairobi, where he had escaped after his community discovered he was gay and threatened to kill him.

His mother, Ferono, is struggling after the death of her husband, and they both find companionship in Ahithophel, the man they've hire to work on the house and grounds.

She is rescued by a cattle rancher near White Sands, where space exploration meets manifest destiny meets cowboy entertainment, launching her on a restless quest across the Southwest. She eventually lands in New Orleans, where she works as a social worker helping people experiencing "moonlessness." Shot through with the speculative while paying homage to three iconic genres—neo-Western, picaresque, and Southern gothic—Izzy's life story becomes a testament to the human will to seek meaning from the universe.

#### Triage by Claudia Rankine

As their kinship continues off and on for decades, "collapse" takes on new meanings that are seen and felt in the violence of their pasts, in art depicting couches where respite might be found, in the ongoing devastation in Gaza, and in the antagonism of their conversation and their love for each other. #### There's a Monster in the Lake by Laura Fernández

Translated from the Spanish by Alexis Almeida

In 1933, a Scottish couple claims to see a creature emerging from the surface of Loch Ness, and the news of the sighting becomes a media phenomenon and a tourist attraction. Almost a hundred years later, Fernández navigates the greenish waters of the loch and finds plesiosaurs, monster hunters, reporters, fake news, and soldier dolphins. She reflects on the acts of imagining, believing, and creating reality; on the line between fiction and truth; on the monstrous and the elusive as keys that open the floodgates to the many worlds that make up our world—one that, Nessie reminds us, is mysteriously fantastic.

# Without Terminus: Untraining the Archive by Chaun Webster Essays / Spring 2026 / World: Graywolf

A reconstruction of the life story of the author's grandfather, whose death Webster attributes to his decades of strenuous, poorly paid labor as a Pullman porter on the Empire Builder train, combined with an exploration of Afropessimist thought. Part elegy, part archival detective story, and part visual poem, *Without Terminus* is a philosophically rigorous and deeply moving text that takes us beyond the archive of loss.

#### This Poor Book by Fanny Howe

For decades, Howe has been our great poet of spirit and conscience, dislocation and bewilderment. *This Poor Book*, completed just before her death, gathers a selection of her work from the last thirty years arranged into an astonishing singular poem. Across this brilliant reconfiguration, we follow the poet as seeker, both faithful and foolish, searching for language and existence beyond the machines of economy, judgment, and war. Howe interrogates the contradiction and violence of the twenty-first century, the misbegotten experiences that have given rise to a culture of authority and adulthood rather than one of innocence and childhood.

## We by Layli Long Soldier

#### Poetry / October 2026 / World: Graywolf

An extraordinary combination of lyric essay, poetry, and visual images. Long Soldier makes use of multiple forms—personal narrative, written and oral history, legal and language studies, visual art—to explore how one generation aids and makes way for the next generation, and the lineage and ancestry experienced through survival, story, and language. She considers the broken treaty of Fort Laramie; the gruesome history of Indian boarding schools; the police murder of George Floyd; and the life of Iron Hail, a survivor of Wounded Knee. #### Black Lake by Emily Skaja

#### Poetry / September 2026 / World: Graywolf

Black Lake looks squarely at a long season of grief brought on multiple miscarriages. Skaja handles this grief with a lyric fervor, a howl and anguish accompanied by offhanded humor when least expected. Throughout there is the recurring powerful repeated image of the "black lake," both a goading and therapeutic image of depression and despair, one that like a black hole wants to suck everything in.
