Caroline Barron is an award-winning writer, manuscript assessor and editor, book reviewer and columnist. Her debut, RIPIRO BEACH: A MEMOIR OF LIFE AFTER NEAR DEATH (Bateman Books, May 2020) won the 2020 New Zealand Heritage Literary Award for Best Non-Fiction Book. She holds a Masters in Creative Writing from the University of Auckland (2015) plus a journalism degree and, in a previous life, owned and ran Nova, a leading model and talent agency. She is currently working on a novel, for which she was awarded Creative New Zealand funding.

DAYLIGHTING

DAYLIGHTING is the story of the intense late-teen 1995 friendship between bookish Becky and stardusted Zoe—music, clubs, art collaboration, spirituality, sex—and what happens when one terrifying night changes their lives, and destroys their friendship, forever.

We meet first person protagonist Becky again 13 years later, drunk for days and mourning the death of her wealthy husband. His death has not only brought back the traumatic events of the night her brother died but somehow has also evoked Zoe's return.

Becky thought she'd left that summer behind, but with Zoe's reappearance she's forced to reconsider her interpretation of that summer's events, as well as where blame lies, her true nature and her place in the world.

Told with stunning emotion and psychological depth, DAYLIGHTING is a timely and compelling first novel by an award-winning memoirist.

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RIPIRO BEACH: A MEMOIR OF LIFE AFTER NEAR DEATH

Does DNA write our destinies? Or do the hands that nurture triumph over nature? What is it that determines who we really are?

Caroline Barron's father never found his birth mother. After he dies suddenly on her twentieth birthday, Caroline develops an insidious fear of her own untimely death. When she nearly bleeds out on an operating table during childbirth, it almost seems her greatest fear is justified. Emerging from the experience a changed woman, Caroline spends the next six years poring over her family history in an attempt to make sense of her inexplicable rage.

The family secrets she unearths threaten to destabilise her identity and carefully built life, eventually leading her to Northland's rugged Ripiro Beach, where past and present dramatically collide.

RIPIRO BEACH is a beautifully written, relentlessly honest memoir. Caroline learns that there are mental health issues, suicide and incarceration in her family and – most significantly – that she is Māori.

In Beckborn, Lancashire, two girls are accused of witchcraft. Samuel travels to the isolated village for an investigation which may pay enough to be his last. He finds a community torn apart by fear and paranoia. His hopes of a simple examination are dashed when the mystery of the two girls unravels in a deadly way. Rescued by another witch-finder, Samuel is plunged into a world of the supernatural and the occult. Strange people with immense power lurk on the fringes of society, hiding behind the veil of superstition and belief, causing chaos in war-torn England.

Samuel must find the girls, before he is hunted down and destroyed, whilst navigating through the violence and suspicion of a country ravaged by war.

THE DEVON LETTERS is a new series of romance novels.

THE DEVON LETTERS SERIES is a series of three books all set on the South Devon coast. In each book the main character is given a letter from the past that changes how she sees herself and her closest family.

A STRANGER AT MY TABLE

Who is the man secretly living at Thornhill, the empty house where Miranda was brought up by her grandparents? And why is he hiding?

His story wrenches her heart – a man scammed by his partner, his house burnt down, his assets gone and struggling to get back on his feet. Miranda – reckless, brave and inventive – feels that Felix is the man for her, but can she trust him or is she risking too much?

MY ENEMY, MY LOVE

Can two people on opposite sides of a high fence find common ground? There is strong, mutual attraction between Jamie, the environmental protester, and Leo Masters, the high-powered developer, but caution and misconceptions get in the way.

But just when it appears that their relationship might have a chance, Jamie overhears a chance conversation that changes everything. She flees to avoid having her heart broken, and Leo is left wondering if she really loved him.

Can the intervention of a well-meaning sister resolve the situation, or are they doomed to remain apart?

TRUSTING THE ENEMY

Callista, a level-headed science teacher, experiences an event of ESP at the Okehampton Castle ruins and becomes a media sensation, when she intervenes to stop a massacre.

Cosmo, geologist and sceptic, publicly states his opinion that this is not the truth, and that it has been exaggerated. But a television chat show throws them together in a situation nobody could have foreseen.

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NOD GHOSH

Award-winning author **Nod Ghosh** was born in the UK and moved to Christchurch, New Zealand where she works as a medical laboratory scientist who enumerates stem cells, diagnoses leukaemia and other cancers by day. This work uses lasers, fluorescent dyes, dichroic glass and more than a little magic. Nod's novel PAPER PRISON draws on that magic, though sadly the uncontrollable nanobots are a figment of the author's imagination. Truth Serum Press has published the following novellas: THE CRAZED WIND (2018), FILTHY SUCRE (2020) and TOY TRAIN (2021). Nod has judged several flash fiction and short story competitions in New Zealand and overseas and been guest editor for SmokeLong Quarterly and the UK National Flash Fiction anthology 2021. PAPER PRISON is her first full-length novel.

PAPER PRISON

Madison Robbins is fourteen minutes older than her twin Ellen, but the second-born girl surpasses Madison in every other way. A congenital disability prevents her from developing as Ellen does.

As a young adult, Madison is subjected to a ground-breaking treatment that enhances her abilities and allows her to enjoy a fuller life. As she ages, she loses some of the benefits the treatment provided.

The year is 2073 when we meet Madison, aged sixty-nine. She is writing her memoir. She discusses her work with her young carer, Gyeong. Madison reveals how their insecure mother Alison stifles the twins' development, introducing uncertainty into the girls' lives. Their disquiet increases when their parents separate.

As a teenager, Madison covets her sister's able-bodied albeit dysfunctional existence, while Ellen opens her twin's eyes to life outside her protective bubble. Their mother's mental health deteriorates and Ellen plays a greater role in her sister's care. This burden increases after their father's sudden death.

After her treatment, Madison graduates from university, and finds work providing support in the disability sector; helping people who are the way she used to be.

When both women fall for Fabien Constantin, their bond is stretched to its limit. The untidy union culminates in the birth of baby Cassie, whom the sisters agree to raise together, after Fabien abandons them. Ellen and Cassie disappear when the child is thirteen years old. Madison is distraught.

Later, Madison works for the elusive Universal, subliminally influencing people through the media, while desperately trying to find her sister and child.



ANNE Harré

GENRE CRIME

Anne Harré has studied music, literature, publishing and creative writing, and was awarded an NZSA Hachette mentorship for the manuscript of THE LEANING MAN. She works as a school librarian, but has also been a music teacher, bookseller, freelance editor and reviewer, and editor for the New Zealand Poetry Society anthology. Anne lives in Wellington and THE LEANING MAN is her first book.

THE LEANING MAN

It's Saturday night in Wellington and celebrations are in full swing for the Westons' wedding anniversary. Their daughter Stella has returned from London to attend. Once shoulder-tapped as detective material, a few bad decisions and a questionable ethical dilemma saw her leave the force under a cloud. She's now a private investigator in London, and she doesn't want to be home. Later that night her best friend Teri is found dead in a lane in the central city. Her phone is missing. It looks like suicide, but Stella won't believe it. Not trusting her former colleagues to find out the truth, she begins her own investigation.

Stella Weston is relentless, foul-mouthed and tenacious. She's not above taking risks to find the truth about her friend and the shady world she's been dragged into, which seems to involve a paedophilia ring smuggling children from Thailand. Someone knew Teri was gathering information to put a stop to it, and the race is on between those who want the phone, the homeless man who's pocketed it, and Stella.

As relentless as its protagonist, THE LEANING MAN is an assured debut, written in the tradition of fellow Kiwi crime writer Paul Cleave – while he draws on the city of Christchurch for the atmosphere of his novels, Anne draws on the windy capital city of Wellington.





LIZZIE HARWOOD

Lizzie Harwood grew up on Aotea Great Barrier Island and writes novels set in the far-flung places she's lived. Her memoir XAMNESIA AND TRIUMPH: COLLECTED STORIES were international Amazon bestsellers. She co-founded the First Pages Prize, an international writing award to support emerging unagented writers. After twenty-four years out of New Zealand, mainly in Paris, she now lives in Auckland with her family.

POLAROID NIGHTS

Auckland city bars, 1996, when the *click / whirr* of a Polaroid 600 proved you were living your best life. Betty's is on repeat: waitress till late, drink till dawn, in bed to forget. But partying like there's no tomorrow is no fix for the problems crowding in. Her ex is back in town, her flat was burgled and she faces eviction if she can't pay rent. And then there's the serial rapist called the Psychic who's terrorising women in their homes. When her ex is murdered and left in her bed, Betty and her flatmate Alabama turn to the bar world to find out who did it – was it the Psychic or someone closer? – and in doing so discover more about their colleagues in the hospitality industry and those on the periphery, like taxi driver Baza.

A confident, fast-paced crime novel that fizzes with the energy of city bars and is fueled with black humour – it brings to mind in story and style the TV hit *The Flight Attendant*. But there's darkness at its heart – the novel draws on the time when the author's flat was burgled by convicted rapist Malcolm Rewa.

POLAROID NIGHTS is the inaugural winner of the NZSA Laura Solomon Cuba Press Prize.







JESSICA KANY

Jessica Kany was born in New York City. She graduated from Washington University in St Louis with a BA in English Literature. Past hats include writing for the Jackson Hole News in Wyoming, indexing the American Alpine Journal, working at a library in Hawaii. She moved to Stewart Island/Rakiura in 2002 and has been editor of the Stewart Island News (SIN) since 2005. She ran the community library for seven years and is now the Halfmoon Bay School librarian. Other hats: shore crew for a crayfisherman; keen rat trapper, trail runner, and mother of two boys.

A RUNNER'S GUIDE TO RAKIURA

Maudie doesn't cut a convincing detective figure. She's an erratic, impulsive, semi-alcoholic Millennial from New York City, on assignment at the bottom of New Zealand to cover southernmost running trails. Or, as her new friend Vil puts it: "Giving brainless bucket-listers hard-ons for islands like mine."

Once she hears the tale of buried treasure on Stewart Island, Maudie embarks on a dogged pursuit of the truth behind Stewart Island's mysteries. What did Vil's great uncle bring back from the battle of Monte Cassino, and where did he hide it? Maudie's hunt sees her befriending Dogbox, the pontificating Yeats-quoting patron of New Zealand's southernmost pub.

She wades into a world of ferns, boat-builders, lighthouses, muttonbirds, dune grass politics, and all the other things that make Stewart Island (Rakiura) such an extraordinary corner of the world. But it's not all a box of birds...dark histories reverberate: the Battle of Monte Cassino in 1944; Maudie's memories from September 11, 2001. As the echoes grow louder, the past loops forward, overtaking Maudie and Vil.

Like any good treasure hunt, there will be reckonings, redemptions, and yes, yes, YES... there will be treasure.

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ANGELIQUE KASMARA

Angelique Kasmara was born in Bandung, Indonesia, and has lived in Jakarta and Sydney. She lives now in Tāmaki Makaurau (Auckland). She has published work in A CLEAR DAWN: NEW ASIAN VOICES FROM AOTEAROA NEW ZEALAND and KO AOTEAROA TATOU | WE ARE NEW ZEALAND. A graduate of the Masters of Creative Writing at Auckland University, Angelique is a winner of the *Sir James Wallace Creative Writing Prize* and ISOBAR PRECINCT was shortlisted for the *Michael Gifkins Prize*.

ISOBAR PRECINCT

An audacious and inventive debut novel set in a vivid, grimy inner-city Auckland

Lestari Aris is a woman on the edge. Her tattoo studio on Karangahape Road is hammered by burglaries; the hangers-on in her life, from a teenage runaway to a married cop, are bonded to her for reasons she can't fathom. And years after Lestari's father disappeared, her Indonesian mother is still lost in a selfmedicated blur.

When a murder in Symonds Street Cemetery whirls Lestari into the orbit of an unpredictable drug, she uncovers a decades-long covert clinical study targeting rough sleepers and others on the fringes – and its dark connections with her own life and history. Kara lives in Victory Park council flats with her young son, just making a living by minding other people's kids – her nightly smoke on the fire escape the only time she can drop her guard and imagine something better. But life is unpromising until the mysterious Bridget moves in to the Park. The wife of a disgraced Ponzi schemer, she brings with her glamour and wild dreams and an unexpected friendship. Drawn in, Kara forgets for a moment who she's there to protect.

Bridget is careless when she's minding Kara's son and selfish in minding her own. When she needs to get out of town during her husband's court case, she takes Kara with her and their two sons, but when the court follows her to retrieve property she takes an overdose, leaving Kara to get back to Wellington with the boys and little money. The trip is a desperate one and things get worse in Wellington when Kara's health declines. But her community at the flats and her mother help get Kara back to health and give her a glimpse of happiness and a new life.

Rachel Kerr writes with huge compassion, humour and insight into life's inequities. VICTORY PARK won the MitoQ Best First Book of Fiction 2021 at the Ockham New Zealand Book Awards.

Zuva Taha has to come to know the bush in the same way she recognises each season. The bush shelters many things, not just wild creatures and snakes. She and her four daughters have to be on guard at all times. And here, in their new home in Harare, culture, war, religion, love, politics, and death make them delve deeper into their relationships, their past, and their present lives.

The Taha family moves from Marondera to settle down in Harare with the hope of bringing fortune into the family. Mwedzi is determined to find more building jobs in Harare to fulfil his promise to Zuva, his wife, to build a house for her and their four daughters, Ruth, Hannah, Abigail and Nyeredzi. In this new city, the Tahas learn that the bush next to their house is sheltering snakes and also the thugs who attack their neighbours. Zuva is a brave woman, but she fears for her daughters' safety.

Weaving through Zuva's narrative is the narrative of the youngest child of the Tahas – Nyeredzi. Nyeredzi embraces her adventurous spirit while she learns about her family, and the new environment. She fights for her freedom to be heard in the house, but two of her sisters, Hannah and Abigail give her grief. Nyeredzi bonds with her oldest sister, Ruth. As she grows up she faces snakes in the field and armed men in her mother's garden. She questions her mother about Christianity and her ancestors. She sees her ancestors, who foretell her future. She learns about womanhood from the women around her and she loses the sister she loves the most when she is shot during a riot.

She moves to study law in Cape Town and then summoned back home to her mother's death bed. She seeks help from her ancestors to save her mother.



BECKY MANAWATU

Becky Manawatu (Ngāi Tahu) was born in Nelson, raised in Waimangaroa on the West Coast of New Zealand, and then moved to live in Germany and Italy, where her husband was playing rugby and where she wrote the first drafts of her award-winning debut novel, AUĒ. She returned to the West Coast with her family and works full-time as a writer. She is currently writing the sequel to AUĒ, titled PAPAHUA.

AUĒ

Taukiri was born into sorrow. *Au*ē can be heard in the sound of the sea he loves and hates, and in the music he draws out of the guitar that was his father's. It spills out of the gang violence that killed his father and sent his mother into hiding, and the shame he feels about abandoning his eight-year-old brother to a violent home.

But Ārama is braver than he looks, and with his friend Beth and her dog, he feels like he might be strong enough to turn back the tide of sorrow. As long as there's aroha (love), stories and a good supply of plasters, which Āri uses to deal with the pain inside that nothing can fix.

*Au*ē means howl or cry, and the story is told through four narrators, whose stories weave together out of the past and into the present: the ghost of Taukiri's mother; Taukiri; Ārama or Ari; Taukiri's mother, Jade, and his murdered father, Toko, until there is some sort reconciliation between those that are left.

Here is a novel that is about personal pain rooted in the past and grown from a wider story that is called colonialism. Both raw and sublime, Manawatu is a compelling new voice in New Zealand fiction.

AUĒ is the winner of the Jann Medlicott Acorn Prize for Fiction 2020, the MitoQ Best First Book of Fiction 2020, the Ngaio Marsh Award for Best Crime Novel 2020, and the Bestsellers Choice Award 2021. It has been on the NZ fiction bestsellers list for well over a year.

If art can capture a soul, what happens when one of those souls escapes?

When junior art appraiser Anita Cassatt is sent to catalogue the extensive collection of the recently deceased reclusive artist Leo Kubin, it isn't only the chilly atmosphere of the secluded house in a fog shrouded coastal town making her shiver.

She assures her boss that she's looking forward to getting on with the job. Anita arrives at the out of the way mansion days before her colleagues, as it is expected that the sheer number of paintings assembled there will take much longer to appraise. Little does she know how much evil lurks in the house and in the portraits themselves or that her boss has disregarded the very specific instructions sent by the owner as to how his vast art collection was to be handled and disposed of.

Once there, Anita is instantly filled with a fear that she is being watched, despite being the only human present. A former professor of Victorian literature at the University of Kent, Wendy now divides her time between Dunedin and Tomarata, north of Auckland.

UNDONE

Liv Burns, a literature professor, is living alone in Fiesole, on the outskirts of Florence, having left her home and job in southeast England because of the fallout from her husband's affair. Luke, also a professor, had announced a few months earlier that he was leaving Liv for a woman he had just met on sabbatical at a research centre in Fiesole. Despite the ensuing conflict, Liv and Luke attempt a reconciliation but Liv's distress over her betrayal results in several lapses of professional judgement, leading to a formal complaint by a student.

The tentative marriage reconciliation then founders when Liv discovers that Luke's sabbatical lover, Mina, is to be interviewed for a post in Liv's department. Liv's plan to sabotage the interview process is thwarted; Mina is appointed while Liv is suspended.

In Fiesole, Liv seeking to understand what led to Luke's affair and regrets the demise of her career. Then she is summoned from Italy by her father's death in New Zealand. Returning to her hometown, Dunedin, where her younger sister has remained, makes the pull of the past and Liv's need for roots starkly apparent.

When Liv finds that Luke (who is in Dunedin to deal with his own elderly parents) had visited her father in hospital before he died, she reaches out to him in the hope that, sometimes, the damage in our lives might be undone.

THE REDEMPTION OF DANIEL MCRAE

Daniel is a presbyterian minister of the old school – raised in the faith, unquestioning, devoted to his congregation, obedient to the precepts of being a good person. But in his commitment to his church, he omits to care for the emotional needs of his wife and child. Doubts about first the goodness then the very existence of God begin to corrode his faith.

When, in his late sixties, he needs to comfort his dying and faithful wife, he confronts the fact that he no longer believes that God exists. Thus begins a fundamental reassessment of what matters, impelled by his taking on the rearing of his baby granddaughter, Evie. As he reflects on his failings as a husband and father, he discovers that his notion of family has been cramped and confining. He wrestles with the conflicting demands of his parishioners and the need to embrace his emerging understanding of what is good and true, without resorting to God.

He lost a son in infancy, and he discovers the existence of another one, now a grown man. He falls in love with a local artist, and fields the disapproval of the widows in his parish.

As Evie grows, he is compelled to honesty and an ongoing reassessment of what he believes in face of her questioning and persists in his pursuit of reconciliation with her mother.

While researching DAUGHTERS OF MESSENE, Maggie travelled to Greece, and ended up at the Mani home of travel writer Sir Patrick Leigh Fermor, celebrating his Name Day with the locals – an unexpected blessing upon this story.

DAUGHTERS OF MESSENE

Artemis has the name of a goddess, but she has trouble living up to it. Instead she usually just runs away. She's running now ... away from the married man she's been seeing, and the Greek community in New Zealand who think they know what's best, and into the arms of family in the Peloponnese that she's never met. It's 2007. She carries her mother's ashes and an iPod with recordings, which bit by bit tell the shocking story of what happened to Artemis's grandmother during the Greek Civil War over half a century earlier.

DAUGHTERS OF MESSENE is a story of a family of women – those who stayed in that broken but beautiful country, one who went to the ends of the earth to escape what she'd seen, and another who returned not knowing what it was she was looking for. A powerful third novel by Maggie Rainey–Smith, who was drawn to the story because her father was a NZ soldier fighting in Crete during WWII.







RENÉE

GENRE COSY NOIR/ CRIME

Renée (Ngāti Kahungunu) turned 92 in 2021. A novelist, poet and playwright, who lives in Ōtaki, New Zealand, she was recently awarded *the Prime Minister's Award for Literary Achievement and the Playmarket Award* for significant artistic contribution to New Zealand theatre. In 2017 she published her bestselling memoir THESE TWO HANDS. THE WILD CARD is her first crime novel and the sequel, BLOOD MATTERS, is due for release in 2022.

THE WILD CARD

How big a secret could a small town like Porohiwi have?

Ruby Palmer has been dealt a rough hand. She was left in a kete at the back door of the Porohiwi Home for Children when she was a baby, and then at seven she discovered that Betty – who stopped the bad stuff happening to Ruby – had drowned. Adopted by a lesbian woman, Ruby grew up loved and tough enough to face anything, and now she's in her thirties, she needs to find out what really happened to her and Betty at the Home. Her only lead is a notebook that uses the symbols in playing cards to tell a story she doesn't understand. She sets off a chain reaction: a man attacks her and there are break-ins at the local theatre where she's acting in Oscar Wilde's The Importance of Being Earnest. As Ruby goes deeper into the mystery at the Home, she starts to find answers to questions she hadn't dared ask including ones about herself as a young Māori girl with nowhere to turn.

Ruby's story is interspersed with quotes from Oscar Wilde's play, which is set a world away and decades earlier but often echoes what's happening in Porohiwi.

The Wild Card was shortlisted for the Ngaio Marsh Awards 2020.





ERICA REX

GENRE NARRATIVE NON-FICTION

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PROFILE

Erica Rex is an American science journalist with a MA in journalism from Columbia University. In 2012, as a breast cancer patient, she took part in a clinical trial at the Johns Hopkins University School of Medicine's Behavioural Pharmacology Research Unit in Baltimore, US. She had two therapeutic treatment sessions with psilocybin to treat her cancer-related depression. The results have been life changing and far reaching. Rex wrote about this experience and the scientific basis of the research study in a lengthy article in 2013 for Scientific American Mind: "CALMING A TURBULENT MIND." The article was translated into Italian, Croatian and Portuguese. She wrote a version for The Independent and spoke about the article and the experience at conferences, and on National Public Radio. She appeared with Dr David Nutt on Sky News and had interview requests from the Portuguese press and the Daily Mail. Erica is an Advisor to the Task Force on Psychedelic Medicine, US Department of Health and Human Services.

THE HERO'S JOURNEY: HOW PSYCHEDELIC MEDICINE WILL TRANSFORM MENTAL HEALTH

THE HERO'S JOURNEY portrays the evolution of psychedelic medicine through the lens of one woman's quest to heal from her childhood trauma.

Erica Rex's psychedelic story begins in 2012, when she was a subject in a clinical trial at Johns Hopkins University School of Medicine's Behavioral Pharmacology Research Unit where she was given doses of psilocybin – the active ingredient in "magic mushrooms" – to treat her cancer-related depression.

The book describes her abuse at the hands of her psychiatrist parents and her encounters with the medical and mental health establishment over the course of several years. She artfully braids the scientific story of psychedelics – their indigenous roots, early experiments, their uses and abuses and the very recent neuroscientific discoveries at Imperial College, London with her own experiences and those of a few key others, including an Iraq War veteran, as well as researchers and practitioners who have toiled for years to make psychedelics part of the western medical pharmacopeia.

Untreated PTSD and its many consequences, including drug- and alcohol- abuse – and myriad other diseases including cancer – affects the lives of hundreds of millions of people around the world. Society suffers from it.

Erica's brave voice provides insight into how psychedelic medicine provides trauma survivors a pathway out of and away from their experiences, a light at the end of a very long tunnel.



PADDY RICHARDSON

Paddy Richardson is the author of two collections of short stories, CHOICES and IF WE WERE LEBANESE and seven novels, THE COMPANY OF A DAUGHTER, A YEAR TO LEARN A WOMAN, HUNTING BLIND, TRACES OF RED, CROSS FINGERS, SWIMMING IN THE DARK and THROUGH THE LONESOME DARK.

A YEAR TO LEARN A WOMAN ('Der Frauenfanger') HUNTING BLIND ('Komm Spiel Mit Mir') and TRACES OF RED ('Deine Schuld') have been published by the German publishers Droemer Knaur and SWIMMING IN THE DARK has been published by Macmillan, Australia.

HUNTING BLIND, TRACES OF RED, CROSS FINGERS and SWIMMING IN THE DARK have all been finalists in the Ngaio Marsh Award.

Paddy has been awarded three Creative New Zealand Awards, the University of Otago Burns Fellowship in 1997, the Beatson Fellowship in 2007 and the James Wallace Arts Trust Residency Award in 2011. In 2012 she represented New Zealand at both the Leipzig and Frankfurt Book Fairs. She is an experienced teacher of creative writing, has been a speaker at many writing festivals and is a mentor for both NZSA and the Whitireia Creative Writing Programme. Paddy lives in Broad Bay, Dunedin.

A YEAR TO LEARN A WOMAN

Freelance writer Claire is hired by a disreputable lawyer to write a biography of serial rapist, Travis Crill serving time for a series of vicious attacks on women. She's wary, but she's also a single mother with a teenage daughter and desperately needs the money. When she interviews him in prison, Crill is chillingly charming.

Can this man be a rapist? Initially there are few clues as to how he became a violent predator, but slowly Claire begins to unravel the story. What are his parents hiding? Why did the rapes occur only every October? And how does he seem to know so much about her? If Crill is locked away in jail, why is Claire so afraid? Could she be Crill's next victim?

Although he has lived almost all of his life in New Zealand, he is a German immigrant and, when the first world war breaks out, he is branded an enemy alien, taken from his home and from Pansy Williams, the woman he loves and interned on Somes Island as a prisoner of war.

There, with other men in a similar situation, he must helplessly wait out the war under the autocratic and often vicious regime of the camp's commandant.

Clem Bright returns after the war, to Blackball. Physically and psychologically maimed by his experiences, he must somehow make something of his life, negotiating his way through family relationships, the hasty marriage he made with Pansy and the child born after he left. Lena Bright is Pansy's child with Otto. Spirited, clever and perceptive, she observes the adults around her, her mama, her nan and her pop and the papa who has returned from war bringing upheaval to her former easy and regulated life.

More than anything she loves her mama and her home. Blackball is where she belongs and it is where she returns when, as a young adult, she paints her memories.

10 DEADLY MYTHS: The Conspiracy Theories that have Underpinned Antisemitism for Centuries looks at how these conspiracy theories still endure and animate violent extremists around the world.

The book focuses on the most dominant and pervasive myths such as blood libel, Jewish global domination and deicide and examines their origins, giving examples of their classic and contemporary usage and ultimately, in this age of fake news, providing a model answer for responses online. For example, the blood libel chapter tells the story of one of the earliest blood libels, that of Simon of Trent in the 15th century, and shows how it was explicitly referenced in the manifesto of the Poway Synagogue shooter in San Diego in 2019.

Andy Southall grew up in Stratford-upon-Avon, England, spent too many years in the fog of London, and then followed the long white cloud – and his wife – to Wellington. Always wanting to write, he completed a creative writing diploma in 2016, and won an *NZSA mentorship* with award-winning author Pip Adam to write BOTH FEET IN PARADISE. He has published two travelogues: ONE HUNDRED DAYS IN SAMOA and 28 DAYS IN SRI LANKA, and a novel, MAKING MEREDITH. His science fiction short stories have appeared in sponge.nz

BOTH FEET IN PARADISE

After months of researching butterflies in Sāmoa, Adam is looking forward to returning home to his family in New Zealand. Then his transfer to the airport doesn't arrive. A hastily arranged taxi takes him not to departures but an empty field in the middle of nowhere, and he misses his flight. As he fails to find alternative ways off the island – other flights, ferries, even seagoing yachts – he grows increasingly frustrated, especially as all overseas phone lines and emails seem to be down as well.

He meets Eve, who offers to help, and Adam accepts but has a strange feeling they've met before. From his point of view in the first half of the book (a Pālagi/European male), we switch to Eve's (a Sāmoan woman) and see with clarity what Adam couldn't: his mind is confused and getting worse. As the two of them go into the past for solace, the depth of their relationship becomes apparent and we understand why both have daughters called Naomi.

BOTH FEET IN PARADISE is a masterpiece of storytelling that suspends the reader in a world of relentless beauty where nothing and no one can be relied on.






BARBARA SUMNER

Hannah 'Birdie' Bird is a 15-year-old under-laundry maid at Angus Hall, a London manor house. Her mother was an aristocrat, thrown out into the streets when her illegitimate child was discovered. Forced into servitude at age 12, Birdie knows how to return the purity of white rags from the dregs of the curse. And how to embed a waft of fresh lavender into bed linen. She knows the secrets of aged urine to bleach away any stain. Gravy and duck fat yield to her ministrations, but she will never accept her life buried in the laundry.

Captivated by the beauty of silk, she 'borrows' a red silk gown from her mistress. She breaks all the rules to apply for a position with a seamstress. But borax and laundry duties have stripped the flesh from callused hands that will never sew. The seamstress sends her away. Bloated with all she does not have, Birdie's frustrations and disappointments grow. Drawn to a flash house one night, she consults a fortune teller who predicts an unthinkable life. There she meets Joe, a charming thief who cons his way into her heart. Together, with Joe's regular girlfriend, they plan an audacious silk heist. Betrayal stalks them. The robbery goes wrong, and they escape. Later, alone with Joe beneath a tent of stolen silks, the police find them. They shoot Joe and arrest Birdie. Grand theft and murder see her sentenced to transportation beyond the seas for the term of her natural life.

On the wharf, surrounded by the heartbreak of family separation, she glimpses Joe. He is alive but grievously injured. Processed onto the ship with the women convicts, Birdie is at the mercy of the seas and the sailors. Her value is no more than cargo. But Joe is onboard. He is alive, and she has hope.



FIONA SUSSMAN

THE DOCTOR'S WIFE

Nothing in pottery teacher Stan Andino's very regular existence prepares him for the moment he discovers his wife naked, except for a black apron, bleaching the lounge carpet.

So begins a nightmare for more than just the Andino family, where all is not what it seems. A CT scan one week later explains the seemingly inexplicable; Carmen Andino has a brain tumour. As Stan and their teenage sons grapple with the diagnosis and frightening personality changes in their wife and mother, Austin and Tibbie Lamb, the Andino's most longstanding friends and a 'power couple' in the community, do everything possible to assist the family in crisis. Austin, the family's GP, oversees Carmen's medical care, while Tibbie picks up on the home front. With their help, the road ahead for the Andinos seems grim, but manageable.

Then Tibbie Lamb's body is discovered at the bottom of Browns Bay cliffs by Eliot Bard, a young autistic man. The death is initially considered 'low priority', a presumed suicide, and assigned to Detective Mitch Winter, who has just returned to his desk after extended leave for depression. Winter is assigned just one other officer – astute, socially-awkward trainee detective Hilary Stark. Then Stark asks for a transfer, and Winter finds himself left alone to work the case. Despite ditching her detective training, Stark finds herself plagued by the Lamb case and is compelled to check in with Winter. She discovers that he shares her same misgivings about the case and is eager for her input.

The two start to work the case in a most unorthodox manner.

THE DOCTOR'S WIFE is told from various characters perspectives. But who is lying, and who is telling the truth when there are multiple potential murder suspects?

WW2 crashes into the lives of all and when the twins enlist in the RAF old loyalties are tested and new ones forged as love and tragedy become equal partners in the lives of both families.

I WISH, I WISH

As mortician at White Lily Funerals Seb has embalmed countless corpses, repacked organs in body cavities, and applied make-up to pallid faces for the mourners' last viewing. You have a job to do and you do it; there's no use wishing for something else. And yet, every so often, Seb does wish for some kind of intervention to jolt him from his dreary existence.

One day, when the dying boy and his mother walk into the funeral parlour Seb comes to believe that he has been granted one wish that will come true. But what to wish for? What is the most worthwhile use of his precious gift? What does he want more than anything? Having to make these decisions forces him to examine his life, at a time when the two main pillars of his existence – his work and his marriage – both collapse.

Through the crises, he discovers unsuspected abilities in himself. Over the course of a week, Seb learns to stand up for himself, he forms meaningful connections with his previously distant children, finds innovative solutions to problems, a new career path, and even sees the possibility of a new love.

I WISH, I WISH has the timelessness and enchantment of a modern fairlytale. On the one hand it is recognisably current; on the other it is almost archetypical in the exploration of primitive fears and desires. Like the Rubik's cube that Gabriel solves on Seb's keyring everything in this novel fits together seamlessly. Big questions are asked within the confines of a modest life, while the repulsive surprisingly finds its place next to the magical.

Winner of the WA Hofmeyer Prize for Fiction and the Kyknet/ Rapport Prize for Fiction and Most Filmable Novel in South Africa. Shortlisted for the Booklover's Choice Award in New Zealand.

Bryan Walpert is the author of LATE SONATA, winner of the 2020 Seizure Viva La Novella Prize, as well as a short story collection, four books of poetry and two of literary criticism. Originally from Baltimore in the US, he is a professor in creative writing at Massey University, Auckland.

ENTANGLEMENT

A memory-impaired time traveller attempts to correct a tragic mistake he made in 1977 when, panicked, he abandoned his brother on a frozen lake in Baltimore to a beating that disabled him. Decades later, in 2011, a novelist researching at the Centre for Time in Sydney becomes romantically involved with a philosopher from New Zealand. A writer at a lake retreat in New Zealand in 2019 obsesses over the disintegration of his marriage following another tragedy.

The three stories travel side-by-side through the novel, not apparently linked. The love story in Sydney plays out backwards via journal entries that includes a writer's research into time travel; the time traveller story is a frantic against-the-clock tale in a Baltimore winter; and the writer's story is told through a series of responses to writing prompts that dig into a failing marriage, the loss of a child, and living with a disabled brother.

An erudite and literary novel written with a poet's eye and using fragmented stories that sprawl across time and countries, ENTANGLEMENT feels like the work of Canadian author Anne Michaels. It nods to speculative fiction but asks the reader to decide if the time travel is real or imagined. The ending is hopeful and potentially redemptive.





KIRSTEN WARNER

She was born in Hastings, and brought up in Tauranga and Auckland where she worked for newspapers and magazines and as a television researcher. She writes poetry and plays in a travelling folk-blues band.

THE SOUND OF BREAKING GLASS

Christel is at shattering point. She's got two small children, her job in reality television is super high stress, she's an activist with Women Against Surplus Plastic and now she's being stalked. To top it off her protest milk bottle sculpture appears to have come to life like the golem of Jewish folklore and is reviving characters from a past she can hardly bear to confront.

Christel is Second Generation – her father was a Holocaust survivor and a refugee to New Zealand after the war – and she cannot focus on the problems in front of her without dealing with an inheritance that is both murky and unresolvable. And how to live with the secrets she begins to uncover in her own life and her father's.

It takes everything imploding around her and a complete breakdown before she finds herself in the place where the pain started: Germany, meeting the ghosts who have been clamouring for her attention.

Set in Auckland in the 1990s, THE SOUND OF BREAKING GLASS is that rare thing – a book that crackles with end-of-millennium urban life while vibrating with a history that's impossible to forget.

It was the 2019 winner of the MitoQ Best First Book Award.

When they go outside to clean up, they see a UFO crash land and when they go to investigate, they discover an injured alien.

This discovery sends them on a dangerous mission to save the alien, who they name Regi, from being captured and experimented on. All is almost lost until they are rescued by the Regi's father who takes Sarah and her cousin into outer space.

On a planet in a completely different galaxy, Sarah will learn the truth about her father's disappearance, but it may not be what she wants to hear. She will also meet Xaveon, an intense and gorgeous alien who believes she is his 'chosen one'.

Written in the style of a 1950s pulp thriller, this is a mix of hardboiled noir, pop culture horror and a lot of humour. The point of difference is to employ familiar horror tropes and storylines but to hatch something fresh and unique within a noir–mystery setting.

So begins Charlie's journey to find a way to reunite the gods, realise the power in the ancient songs his grandfather taught him, and discover why he was the one for the task.

The BAD UNICORN series follows ten-year-old school girl Harriet and her best friend Anika as they grapple with the realities of looking after the unicorn Harriet has brought to life by putting magic pencil to magic paper. Harriet imagined an obedient easy-care pet with all the qualities of fictional unicorns: gentility, sweetness and the potential for magic. But like many a real pet, the talking unicorn, Star, is anything but obedient and the opposite of easy-care.

The size of a small dog, he has the trouble-making capacity of a much larger creature. Rude, willful, needy, greedy and badly behaved, like any real animal, he's an independent creature with a mind of his own. He is not entirely without magic though, some useful, and some disadvantageous, which becomes apparent over the series.

The series currently includes three books with themes of being responsible for something or someone else, friendship, family, animal welfare, the ethics of animal testing and experimentation, reality vs. expectations, bullying and self-belief/confidence.
