Jack—a former playwright mourning his failed career—catches his husband, Randy, packing his mother's urn for their trip to Oregon. Parents, living or otherwise, aren't the ideal guests for romantic getaways, but Randy has been carrying his mother's remains everywhere since her death, and he isn't ready to let go now.

Despite its natural beauty and kitschy charm, the Oregon coast does not provide the respite the couple seeks. Instead, their surroundings and encounters with locals grow increasingly surreal as the days pass. An overly -dedicated Method actor, tantra-obsessed neighbors, and a child environmentalist who may be able to communicate with the dead are but a few of the characters whose presence exposes long-simmering tensions that threaten to undo Jack and Randy's marriage—to say nothing of their hold on reality.


Clarice's breakup with P.T. began the usual way—she discovered he was cheating—and ended with a restraining order and a one-way ticket from New York to L.A.



Julián Delgado Lopera is an award-winning Colombian writer and historian based in Brooklyn.. Delgado Lopera is the author of the novel *Fiebre Tropical* (Feminist Press), as well as the nonfiction books *Quiéreme* (Nomadic Press) and *¡Cuéntamelo!* (Aunt Lute Books).

The electric new novel from the author of the Kirkus Prize-finalist Fiebre Tropical, narrated by a love-starved girl, her charismatic yet neglectful father, and the trans woman who attempts to keep the family together.

Isolated in a Bogotá apartment, Ignacio's inner light has dimmed, leaving his thirteen-year-old daughter Valentina to raise herself after the death of her mother, who had been pushed to her limit by Ignacio's frequent affairs with other men. Stepping into a maternal role is Mamadora Eléctrica, a trans woman who introduced Ignacio to the city's queer scene years prior.

A love-starved Valentina longs for Ignacio to snap out of his depression and to discover the details of her mother's drowning, but he is stuck in the past, haunted by memories of the young man he loved and betrayed. Meanwhile, Ignacio may lose Valentina to his wife's family if he continues to neglect his daughter.

Told from three points of view—Valentina's, Ignacio's and Eléctrica's—Pretend You're Dead and I Carry You is an irreverent and heartbreaking voice-driven novel in both English and Spanish. Exploring the damage that machismo and self-loathing inflicts on both the individual and those in their orbit, this a coming-of-age story about coming undone.

Momo Yamaguchi was born in Tokyo, educated in the U.S., and lives and works in London. Hello, Limerence is her first novel.

limerence [li-mer-uhns] noun

the state of being obsessively infatuated with someone, usually accompanied by delusions of or a desire for an intense romantic relationship with that person: Her limerence lasted for around three months before she actually met him.

Mika is about to turn 25, and all she has to show for it is a soul-sucking office job and a terminal case of virginity. Between unwanted advances from coworkers and subway commuters alike and love-bombing fuckbois, Mika's ready to explode. Her only therapeutic outlet is her imagination, which manifests in a series of comically violent and horny fantasies that border on the surreal.

Caught in a love(less) triangle, Mika also must weather a mysterious pandemic spurred by the unhygienic bathroom practices of white westerners. Will she emerge from quarantine a new woman, or will she give in to her loser instincts? A reunion with an estranged friend may hold the key to her happiness if she doesn't manage to fuck it up.

Channeling the female rage of *Butter* by Asako Yuzuki and *Boy Parts* by Eliza Clark (minus the murder!), the obsessive gaze of *Acts of Desperation* by Megan Nolan (but funny!), and the warts-and-all honesty of Samantha Irby (a confirmed blurber!), *Hello, Limerence*, introduces a writer to watch (and maybe fear, in a good way!).



Living at The Mountain, the cult's fortress-like compound, he must hide his queerness in accordance with the Master's teachings to transcend into godhood, and he won't survive unless he finds a different way to transcend.

With the religious trauma of R.O. Kwon's *The Incendiaries*, the queer angst of Garth Greenwell's *Cleanness*, and the complex family dynamics of Ocean Vuong's *On Earth We're Briefly Gorgeous*, *The Consummation of an Ordinary Person* explores the fear of the unknown—particularly in regards to religion, homophobia, why unwilling members of a cult can take so many years to leave, and what happens after they lose their family, friends, and faith.

A girl sets out to find her father after he is carried off by an otherworldly creature in this atmospheric horror Western.

While other twelve-year-olds are in school, Charlie spends her days skinning the animals her father hunts in the wild woods just outside their cabin. Charlie's life in the Montana Territory is a lonely one, as her father is a mercurial man of few words who mostly ignores her until there's a chore to be done.

One night, a living nightmare appears, stalking out of the trees. Neither animal nor human, the Beast drags Charlie's father into the wilderness. To find him Charlie enlists the aid of two unlikely allies: an Englishman with a connection to a mysterious occult society and a Cheyenne policeman exiled for a crime he didn't commit.

Yet as she and her allies prepare for a confrontation with the Beast, Charlie will need to decide if her father is ultimately worth saving. What does she owe the man who called her daughter yet never showed her love?

The Unheld is an unsettling and soulful historical horror novel—perfect for readers of Christopher Buehlman's Between Two Fires, Andy Davidson's The Boatman's Daughter, and T. Kingfisher's What Moves the Dead. The novel's ingeniously conceived monster will set your skin crawling, while the indomitable heroine at the story's center will capture your heart.



Dr. Mara Gordon, a faculty member at Cooper Medical School of Rowan University, explores life in a fat body from personal experience as well as clinical expertise.


This clear-eyed, compassionate book—the first on body liberation from a practicing physician who happens to be fat—dismantles the fatphobia embedded in modern medicine.





With Rax King's trademark blend of irreverent humor and heartfelt honesty comes a new collection of personal essays unpacking bad behavior. Sloppy explores sobriety, begrudging self-improvement, and the habits we cling to with clenched fists.

In "Proud Alcoholic Stock," King examines her parents' unwavering dedication to 12 step programs and the texture her family history has lent to her own sobriety. "Shoplifting from Brandy Melville" is a lighthearted look at (what else?) shoplifting from Brandy Melville.

King writes about her overspending and temper control issues as well as her poorly managed mental health. These seventeen essays capture the personal and generational vices that make us who we are.
