




Fart's Favourite Smells by Zoe Foster Blake, Adam Nickel



An A to Z of Dreaming Differently by Tracey Dembo, Lucia Masciullo


















A Life Song by Jane Godwin, Anna Walker

Jessica and Stephen Parry-Valentine are an Australian couple with a love for travel and adventure. In 2014, the desire to drop everything to explore the world overwhelmed them, and before they knew it they were flying the nest and jumping on a one-way flight across the globe . . . and they have never looked back.

Since then, they have travelled to over 80 countries, bringing 2.1 million fellow travel addicts along for the ride. With a passion for filmmaking and photography, they are well-known for their YouTube travel series: Flying the Nest is Australia's most popular travel channel on the platform.

In 2020 Jessica and Stephen embarked on their biggest adventure yet, becoming parents to little Hunter. *Our Home on Wheels* is their first picture book, inspired by their travels around Australia as a family.






Our Home On Wheels

- Both Turia's and Emilie's (the illustrator) heritage is Tahitian, and the super-cute and stunning illustrations from Emilie bring an authentic and gorgeously colourful representation of the Island environment as the perfect backdrop to Koko's story.



George likes living by the sea, but he often feels lonely. He'd like to have a friend – someone to talk to, someone to share stories with and someone to laugh with. As that's what friends do!



Parcel For... series by Shelley Knoll-Miller





"Daddy," she asked, "where did the Moon come from?"


"From the Earth, Abigail," replied Daddy. "The Moon was once a part of the Earth."

The Sparrow by Tessa Duder


